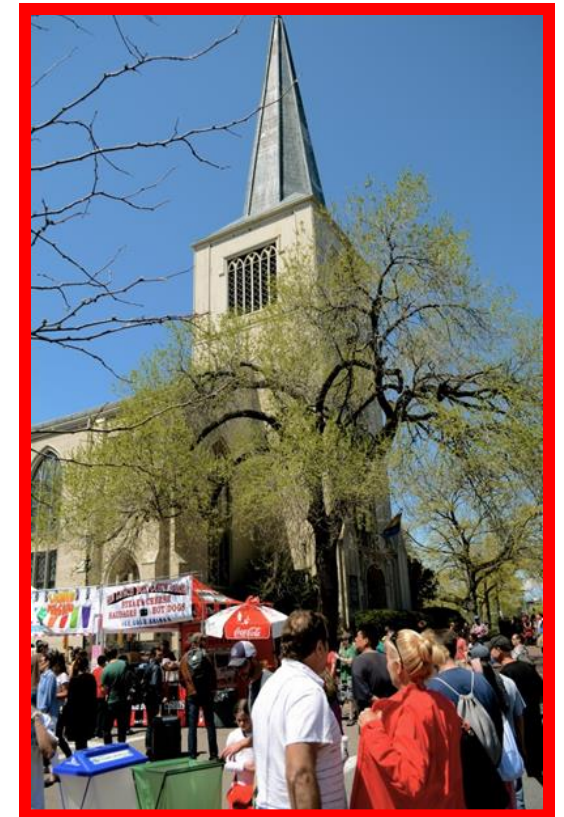

Points of Interest

Old Burying Ground

corner of Massachusetts Avenue & Garden Street

The Old Burying Ground, also known as God's Acre, was set aside from public lands before 1635. Here are buried the earliest Harvard presidents and ministers and many colonial settlers such as Stephen Daye, the first printer in the colonies. Several veterans of the Revolution, including two black soldiers, Cato Stedman and Neptune Frost, also lie here.

Old Mile Marker

corner of Massachusetts Avenue & Garden Street

The 1767 Milestones are historic milestones located along the route of the Upper Boston Post Road between the cities of Boston and Springfield in Massachusetts.

Dawes Island

corner of Massachusetts Avenue & Garden Street

Dawes Island, a traffic island, commemorates William Dawes' ride through Cambridge on April 18, 1775 alerting colonial minutemen of the approach of British army troops prior to the Battle of Lexington and Concord at the outset of the American Revolution.

Charles Sumner Statue

intersection of Massachusetts Avenue & Church Street

Charles Sumner was an academic lawyer, senator, politician, and was the head of the anti-slavery forces in Massachusetts. The Charles Sumner statue in Harvard Yard was constructed for the 200th anniversary of his birth on January 6th, 1811.

College House/Richard T Greener Plaque

1430 Massachusetts Avenue

Richard T. Greener, the first African American to graduate from Harvard, had a distinguished career in public service. He was admitted to the bar in 1876, served as dean of the Howard University Law School, and practiced law and held public service positions in Washington and New York.

Cambridge Common

Garden and Watertown Streets

During the American Revolutionary War, George Washington first gathered his troops here. The Common is home to the tree under which he did so, as well as three abandoned cannons and the Irish Famine Memorial

Christ Church

Zero Garden Street

Christ Church Cambridge is housed in the oldest church building in Cambridge. In 1778 a British prisoner was accidentally shot by a sentry. The church was opened for his funeral. During all this, the fuming Revolutionaries of Cambridge pillaged the church and fired guns. It's from this time that the infamous bullet holes in the vestibule may date. George and Martha Washington prayed here on New Year's Eve, 1775.
