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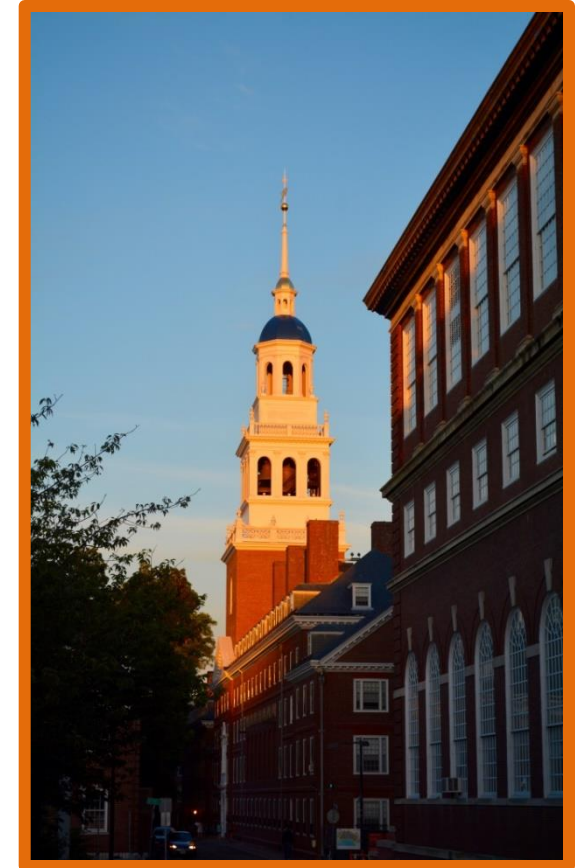

## Points of Interest

**Winthrop Park**

*intersection of Mt. Auburn & JFK Streets*

On this piece of land, Cambridge (then called New Towne) built its first farmer's market. Even then, Cantabrigians were conscientious about eating local. Winthrop Park was bordered by the old jailhouse, the residence of many of Cambridge's most infamous Puritans. The accused witch Elizabeth Kendall had the first floor suite (there was only one room), and was sentenced to hang here. Anne Hutchinson resided here until she was, along with a few heretical followers, banished to Rhode Island. Ah, good times. As the city grew, Winthrop Square resisted buildings, and today has a variety of street musicians, tour guides, and sunbathers in the grass on a hot summer day.

**Retention Wall – Charlie's Kitchen**

*98 Winthrop Street*

Right up until the 1990's, the Cox-Hicks house, located at 98 Winthrop Street was a private residence. First built c.1802, this modest four-room cottage was home to the widow Susannah Cox, changing hands just a few years later to the widow Elizabeth Hicks. It is recognized by the Cambridge Historical Commission as an historic landmark and the oldest surviving example of low-income housing in the area. Located in the earliest settled section of Old Cambridge, it is situated atop an ancient stone retaining wall that dates back to c.1634. The retaining wall shielded the home and its immediate surroundings from the tidal changes of the free-flowing Charles River, back before the locks were put in at the harbor.

**JFK Memorial Park**

*970 Memorial Drive*

Located on the Charles River, the John Fitzgerald Kennedy Memorial Park occupies a prime location in the City of Cambridge. A series of gateways, steel picket fences, and plantings create a soft green space for informal recreation. At each gateway, portals display excerpts from JFK's speeches. The focus of the park is a fountain memorial to President Kennedy, located on axis with a pedestrian link to Harvard University, of which the President was an alumnus.

**King Bhumibol Adulyadej Monument**

*intersection of Eliot & Bennett Streets*

This monument commemorates the birth of His Majesty King Bhumibol Adulyadej of Thailand at Mount Auburn Hospital on December 5, 1927 while his father, Prince Mahidol, was a student at Harvard Medical School. The square was dedicated on April 8, 1990 by Her Royal Highness Princess Chulabhorn, youngest daughter of their Majesties the King and Queen of Thailand. This plaque was unveiled on November 14, 1992 by Her Royal Highness Princess Maha Chakri Sirindhorn.

**Professor John Winthrop Plaque**

*95 Mt. Auburn Street*

Prof. John Winthrop was the greatest American mathematician and philosopher of his time and a fellow of the Royal Society. He lived here from 1746 to 1779.
