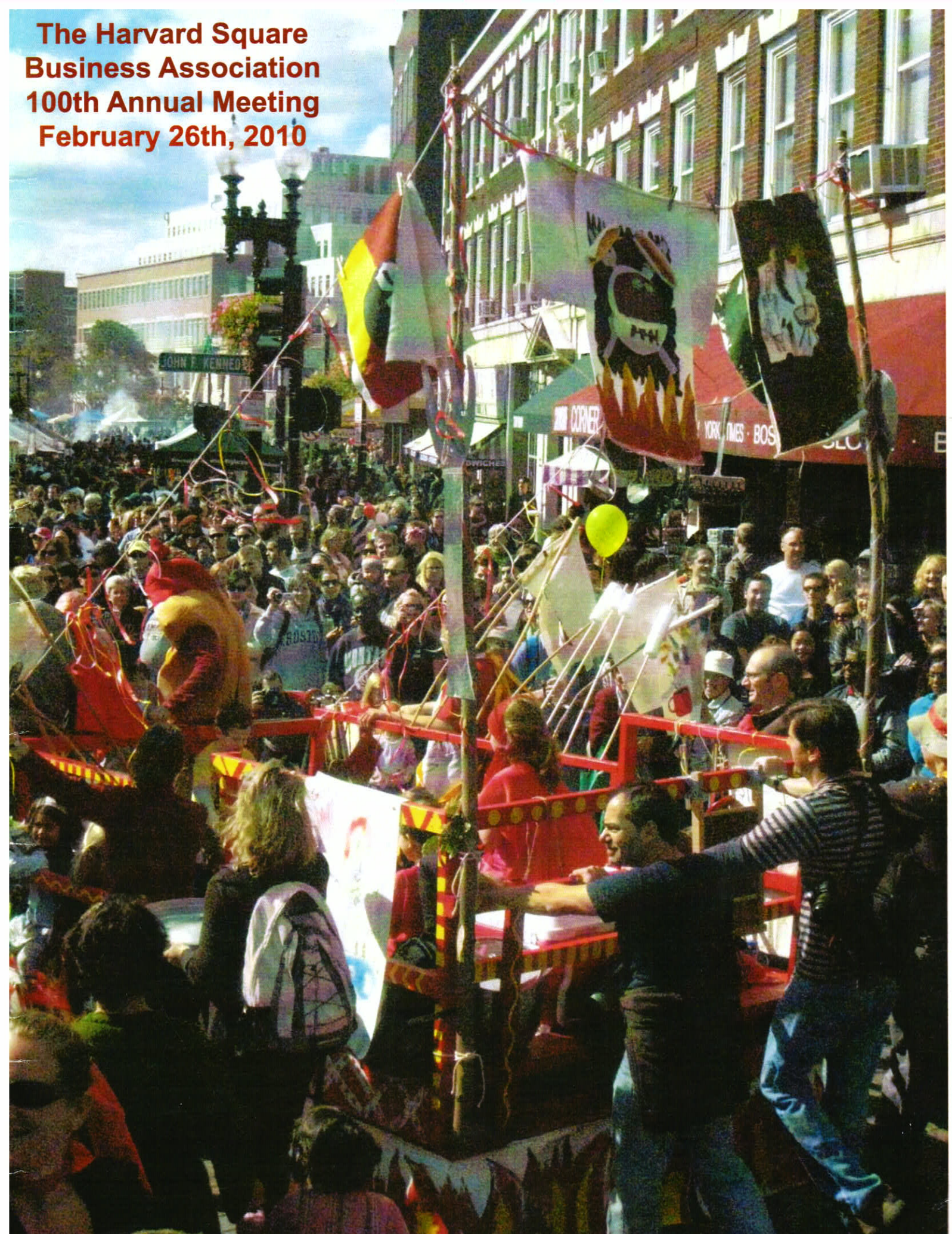

President John DiGiovanni called the meeting to order at 9:03 am with introductions.

The Minutes of the January 2010 board meeting were approved.

Treasurer: Brian Kelley proposed the 2010 budget. Projected investment funding is to be held steady at \$150,000. He noted that the budget assumes that internet income will increase and marketing income will decrease. Mayfair and Oktoberfest income is expected to remain flat.

Income and expense for the HSBA Centennial Gala are both projected at \$75,000. Denise and Brian both stressed that the committee hopes to make a profit on the Gala, but that initial projections are conservative.

The proposed budget includes an increase for office staff expense and for advertising/public relations expense.

As part of the budget discussion Denise noted that Roger Fussa will provide pro bono advertising consulting to determine additional ways to obtain advertising revenue, including through advertisement on the HarvardSquare.com home page. Denise also noted that the SuperTours trolley ads (generously donated by SuperTours) have been terrific. Jerry Murphy said that a BU administrator had recently told him that the Kenmore Square website is not getting as much traction as it wants because the Harvard Square site keeps popping up on search engines.

Kari Kuelzer suggested that the HSBA devote resources to designing applications for the iPhone and other smart phones, as that is how many people access web information.

Committee Reports:

Membership: *Mary-Catherine told us that membership retention is a key goal this year. She suggested that Board members get out and invite members to the upcoming February 26 annual breakfast—we want to make all members feel included. Denise will send a listing of non-members to all attendees of the meeting.*

Jonathan Banker recently completed a business survey of the Square. Denise reported that 79% of the 370 businesses in Harvard Square are locally-owned, 16% are national firms, and the rest are regional businesses. Currently, Square real estate is 94% occupied. There is 1.1 million square feet of space, of which 200,000 square feet is occupied by hotels.

Events: *Robin Lapidus told the group about the wonderful outpouring of support among Harvard Square businesses for organizations supporting victims of the Haitian earthquake. Recent fundraising events have been held by The Charles Hotel, Club Passim, UpStairs on the Square, Via Vai, Plan B and Henrietta's Table.*

She then alerted us to upcoming happenings in the Square, occurring almost constantly through the spring. John DiGiovanni complimented the HSBA staff members, saying that they are “dedicated to constantly promoting the Square and making our organization shine”.

David Chilinski added that Legacy Place, his recent project, has received accolades, but that Harvard Square has an even stronger story to tell. It is a vibrant, mixed-use neighborhood that has a long history. The “latest thing” in retail spaces has been in the Square all along!

Restaurant Committee: Denise reported that the Taste of Cambridge will be held at the Charles Hotel again this year. Beneficiaries of the event will be the Cambridge YWCA and Citysprouts.

Internet: Rachel reported that site usage in January was about the same as in January 2009. It was noted that some organizations have received many more hits this year (restaurants) and others are down (retail stores).

The meeting was adjourned at 10:00 am.

Dear Members and Friends:

As I review this agenda, I can't help but be proud that we have not deviated from our original mission or vision and that certain traditions continue to be carried out.

The Harvard Square Business Association was established in 1910 and Incorporated on May 20, 1936. The signed and sealed document of incorporation states, "The object of the association shall be to advance the commercial, industrial, and public interests of Harvard Square; to promote a commercial exchange; to accumulate and give to its members business information; to adjust controversies and misunderstandings; to establish and maintain uniformity in commercial transactions; and to promote just and equitable principles of trade."

In the 1924 Annual Report, Secretary N. Russell Cazmay states,

"As secretary of the Harvard Square Business Men's Association, I herewith tender my annual report. The directors have held 11 meetings at which the average attendance has been around 50. We met in May to discuss principally Traffic Regulations in Harvard Square.

Our next meeting was in November and Congressman Dallinger was the speaker. At the January meeting, we had as guest speaker City Engineer Hastings. Mayor Quinn had also been invited but was called out of town at the last moment.

In March, we had Speaker Benjamin Loring Young, of the Massachusetts House of Representatives, who gave us a very concise address on the state administration.

The Association is responsible for the three additional clerks furnished at the Harvard Square Post Office and it is gratifying to state that we found Postmaster Baker most willing to cooperate. It is felt that the last hearing on the Harvard Square subway structure will bear fruit in the right direction. The widening of Church Street and the acceptance of Palmer Street is at present, under consideration by the City Council.

Our appreciation to the Cambridge Trust Company for its kindness in allowing us to hold the director's meetings in its room." (1924)

During the past century, The Harvard Square Business Association has spearheaded initiatives that resulted in significant contributions to Harvard Square; from the earliest incarnation of Electrified Lampposts, to the latest, Free Outdoor Public WiFi! Over these many years, the HSBA has cared for the Square, improved the public space, and strengthened the business community by developing and nurturing partnerships with the City of Cambridge, Harvard University, property and business owners, residents, and students...and we continue to thank the Cambridge Trust Company for its kindness in allowing us to hold the director's meetings in its conference room.

I am honored to serve as your Executive Director and am profoundly grateful for your continued support.

“The State of the Square”

An Overview of Harvard Square

February 26, 2010

The following information represents the most recent (01/2010) survey of businesses in Harvard Square based on data available from a variety of sources; Property Owners, Business Owners, City of Cambridge Property Data Base, Websites, Verizon Super Pages and door-to-door site visits.

- *Based on information available, total square footage is approximately 1,100,000 of which approximately 200,000 square feet is hotel space.*
- *Of the total Square Footage, 94% is occupied. Approximately 67,865 sq. feet is currently available for lease.*
- *The HSBA has inventoried a total of 369 businesses (mostly comprised of first and second floor businesses) in Harvard Square, of which 14 retail/restaurant spaces are vacant. Of the occupied businesses; 56 are categorized as national chains, 22 are regional companies, one is an international company and 290 are locally-owned independent businesses.*
- ***Locally owned, independents account for 79% of the inventoried businesses in Harvard Square.***
- *Regionally owned companies, like EMS and JP Licks make up 5% of the businesses in Harvard Square.*
- *National companies, such as The Gap, Urban Outfitters and Ann Taylor account for 15% of the businesses in Harvard Square.*
- *Of the 369 businesses listed, 72% (265) are HSBA members geographically located within the Harvard Square business district.*

- *Other Significant Information:*
- **Parking Lots:** *Harvard Square has a total of (6) Public Parking Lots that are non-city owned creating a combined total of 1563 parking spaces.*
- *Additionally, there is (1) **Municipal parking** lot with a total of 37 spaces and **on-street parking** within the Harvard Square Overlay District accounts for an additional 497 spaces.*
- **Wifi:** *The HSBA launched Free Outside Wifi Access to the public on June 4, 2008 using Meraki technology. Since that time, over 106,000 visitors to Harvard Square have accessed wireless internet. The network in Harvard Square is the second largest Meraki network in the United States.*
- *The Cambridge Savings Bank established in 1834, is the **oldest** business in the Square.*
- *The **smallest** business is Zipa Jewelry with 60 square feet and the **largest** is the Coop with 88,400 square feet.*
- *There are 16 bookstores in Harvard Square.*
- *After exhaustive research, we believe the Harvard Square Business Association is the second oldest business association in the United States; second only to the South Philadelphia Business Association which was founded in October 1897.*
- *On September 7, 1972, the Harvard Square Business Men's Association changed their name to the Harvard Square Business Association.*

Recently we sent this e-mail to our membership; we are delighted, but not surprised by the wonderful responses from our members...

“As you know, this is our Centennial year. As part of our Centennial research project, it occurred to me that, that unlike our 1910 membership, our current membership is incredibly diverse. 2010 members include folks who were born in Nigeria, Barbados, Thailand, Greece, and Korea. We have members from Peru, Mexico, Portugal, India and France. To celebrate and honor the heritage of all our members, I hope that you might be willing to share with me your country of origin and the year you started your business in Harvard Square.

A quick e-mail will be fine. I'll happily take any and all information you are willing to share, and thank you for your time and consideration. I would like to receive your information as soon as possible, as I am compiling some fun facts to share at our 100th Annual Meeting on February 26th.”

Here's our story, though not interesting, still part of the statistics:

Irving House, formerly Irving House of the Kirkland Inn, was started as a hotel in 1945 by emigres Frances and Vangel Misho, as I related, husband and wife from **Romania** and **Albania** (not sure who was from where). They arrived in 1937, I think, buying 67 Kirkland Street m in 1938. Mr. Misho got a graduate degree from Harvard Business School; his wife ran the business.

My partners and I, **Americans** all for several generations (mostly Anglo ancestors) bought the property in 1990. Though my two partners are men, the organization has always been that I run the operations completely. So Irving House, whether as part of Kirkland Inn or by itself, has been woman owned and operated since 1945. Still hoping the Mishos were part of HSBA way back when.

From Justin Slate, Bob Slate Stationers

Bob Slate grew up on the farm in Bernardston, Massachusetts. Ancestors go back long enough in New England that we are not sure of where they came. Guess you would call him a **Yankee**. The same sort as Burdett Johnson. I'm reasonably sure he moved the

contents of his stationery store in Allston into his cousins beef stew establishment on Holyoke Street in 1933 and moved up to 1286 Mass. Ave in 1936. He expanded to the 1288 space in 1951 when Phillips Book Store moved down next to the Cambridge Trust Co.

From Wells Dow, Harvard/Brattle Square

I am the third generation Dow to be involved with Harvard/Brattle Square, after my grandfather George L. Dow and my uncle, Richard A. Dow. We have all been in **Massachusetts** all our lives, so not a lot of diversity on our part.

From John Schall, Fire + Ice

I started Fire+Ice @ Harvard Square in August 1997. It's almost 13 years.
I'm 100% **German**. My 7 times Great Grandfather left Selz Germany (in Alsace/Lorraine on the French/German border) in 1806 mostly because they were German Catholic and they were on the wrong side of the French Revolution. Catherine the Great had just conquered the area around the Black Sea from the Turks and she offered everyone in this German farming village 75 years of special privileges (they didn't have to serve in the Russian army, they could be governed by their own laws, they could practice Roman Catholicism instead of Russian Orthodoxy, etc) if they would move to the area around Odessa and teach the local population, who were mostly nomads, how to farm. The entire village of Selz, Germany moved, lock, stock and barrel to a place outside of Odessa that they called Selz, Russia. This German community never intermingled with the surrounding Russian community at all and in 1886 after their 75 years of special privileges were up (they started to be persecuted for their Roman Catholicism) they picked up lock, stock and barrel and moved to north central North Dakota, in a community which strangely enough they called Selz, North Dakota. My paternal grandfather was 12 when they moved to North Dakota from Russia and my paternal grandmother was 7. My mom's parents were born shortly after they got to North Dakota but their parents were born in Selz, Russia. My parents are third cousins. Not surprising since this community was pretty isolated for over 100 years. I have a document which notates all of the possessions my 7 times great grandfather (his name was Jacob Schall) took with him from Selz, Germany to Selz, Russia. There is an organization called "The Germans from Russia Society" which is where we found out all of this. An interesting tidbit, Lawrence Welk, was also from all three of these Selzs. My dad knew him growing up.

There, that was probably more than you were looking for! John

From Kari Kuelzer, Grendel's Den
Grendel's Den was started in 1971 by Herbert Kuelzer, born in Unter-Ammergau, **Germany**, and Sue Kuelzer (née Schwartz) of the Bexley, **Ohio**.
The business is currently operated by daughter Kari Kuelzer, born in **Cambridge MA** at Mt. Auburn Hospital.

From Julianne Idlet, Cycle Kids, Inc.
I am Italian - my grandparents all settled in **Cambridge**, coming from **Italy** when very young. CYCLE Kids was founded in 2004 in my home a few blocks from where we are now located. We've been a member of the HSBA for about 2 months :)

Cambridge Chronicle for 75th Anniversary of the Association— May 1986

“The Harvard Square Business Men’s Association was organized in April of 1910. The Association was formed to address the difficulties encountered by Harvard Square businessmen due to the subway construction. Some of these problems stemmed from the open-cut construction the subway contractors employed in Harvard Square. Because of the open cut, people and vehicles tracked dirt and clay throughout the square into the stores. The construction also impaired traffic flow, and Harvard Square businessmen faced a loss of business because of the congested conditions of the street. In response to these difficult and changing conditions, the Harvard Square Business Men’s Association hoped to help its members increase their business through an exchange of ideas and knowledge on ‘the science of doing great business.’”

“...The Association has been involved in various projects, many of which have aided the community as well as the businesses. Throughout its history, the Harvard Square Business Association has had the good fortune to have among its members well-informed and concerned...business owners.

“Perhaps the organization also continues to grow because Harvard Square has really become ‘the business center of Cambridge.’”

“The businessmen played a part in what was perhaps the most important development in the square during this decade. In 1959, Harvard University, which had cultivated its relations with the Association over the years, petitioned for a zoning change in order to build the 100-foot high Holyoke Center. The Harvard Square Business Men’s Association backed Harvard’s request for a zoning change, and Harvard Square took its place in the modern world with its first high-rise building.”

“The Harvard Square Business Association includes as its areas of concern membership drives and activities, marketing and promotion, care for the Square’s environment. Special events such as the Octoberfest, community relations, surveys and publications, finance and budget, and of course, traffic and parking.”

According to the first published Bulletin of the Harvard Square Business Men's Association, dated April 1911, the construction of the new subway created untold problems for businesses in Harvard Square.

“The business men of the Square met this situation by uniting together to help each other in handling their business in the best possible manner. As a result more interest in the science of doing business has developed, and with increased knowledge and thought paid to the important matters of strong and effective advertising, clean stocks of goods, and efficient service, there is bound to result an increased and better business.”

To meet these changing conditions satisfactorily, the Harvard Square Business Men's Association was organized about a year ago, and this Bulletin is published to inform the people of Cambridge and of cities and towns to the west and north, how well the Harvard Square banks, merchants and master mechanics can and will serve the people of this district.

This Association includes practically all the leading trades people in many lines of business in and about the Square. Since its organization, they have been considering carefully, ways and means towards dealing with their increased public that with proper and legitimate methods a larger local business may result.” (1911)

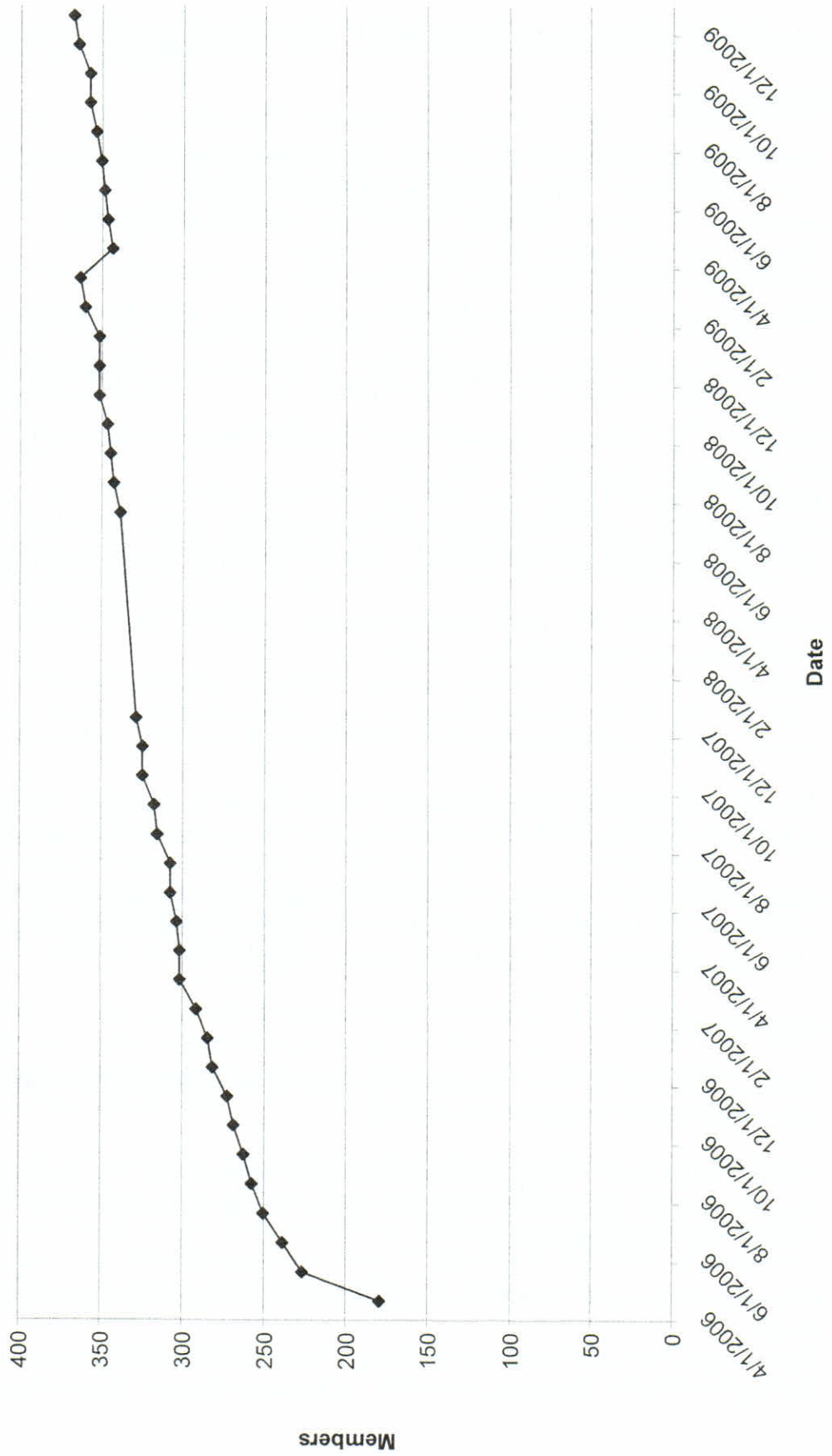

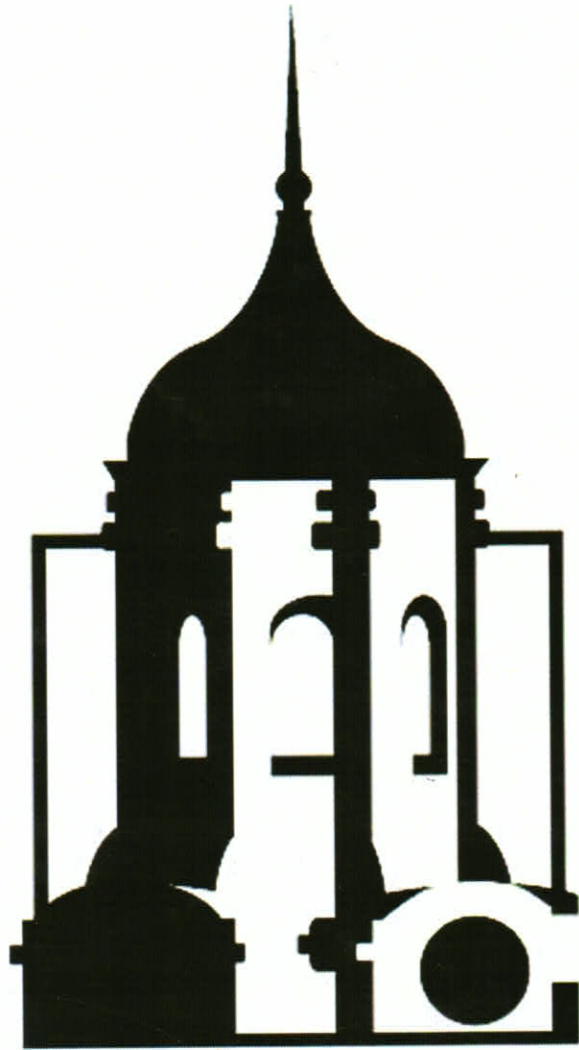
